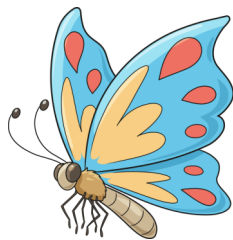
### **BUS TRIP: GAINESVILLE MUSEUMS**

When everyone's ready to leave, the bus will drive to Butler Town Center where there are several restaurants to choose from for lunch. This week’s political candidates forum went well. Those who spoke with me afterward — both candidates and attendees — said they felt appreciative. Early primary voting at the JKPL ends Saturday, Aug. 17. Then, Primary Voting Day is Aug. 20. General Election Day is Nov. 5.

If you haven’t yet voted and would like more information on those who are running for office, literature provided by the candidates is available on a table near the IC. Please note that for the current election, the primary, you will only vote to determine which of your registered party (Democrat, Republican or Non-Party Affiliate) will run in the General Election.

Walkers and scooters are wonderful mobility aids. If it is helpful, we always encourage you to use it. We don’t want you to fall! Unfortunately, there’s only so much room on our trip bus for these important tools. Only one or two scooters (or motorized chairs) can fit. And there’s only room for up to six walkers. It’s a problem of logistics — how the bus was built. When you sign up for a trip, you **must** tell the IC that you need your scooter or walker. If you show up to board, and your scooter or walker is not indicated on the sign-up sheet, you will have to leave it behind. It’s unfortunate, but it’s how it has to be. Please keep this in mind when you are signing up for bus trips.

**Member Services Tip of the Week**

During a power outage, only those with permission are allowed to run an extension cord into their apartment from an emergency power outlet. If you require electricity for medical reasons, speak with Building Manager Jim Powell and your service coordinator so we can have your need on record. Emergency power is not to be

used to keep refrigerators running. If you have medications that must be kept cool, those medications can be kept in the Phillips Center refrigerator for you while your apartment is without power. If you have further questions about this subject, speak with your service coordinator.

**Scam Tip of the Week:  
Registration Fee Voucher Scam**

You receive a “Final Notice” in the mail in reference to a vehicle or residence you currently own or formerly owned. The letter contains legitimate details about the vehicle or residence that are available in public records, including your name, address, and other information about the vehicle or residence. Attached to the letter is a “Registration Fee Voucher” — a check for \$199 or a similar amount. Cashing this check is your acceptance to the scam program and will result in you owing the scam company thousands of dollars. Do not call the number, and do not cash the check. Shred the letter and forget about it.

**COVID CONCERN**

COVID has reared its head again! I know of two cases in different sections of ACV. I hope this alerts everyone to pay attention to how they feel, and to get tested if necessary.

I encourage you to read the article on Wastewater data dated Aug. 12, 2024, by Mary Kekato. ABC News's Yuri Bendadjaoud contributed to this report. It can be found online at <https://abcnews.go.com/Health/covid-cases-increasing-us-amid-summer-bump/story?id=111770385>. The following are some excerpts:

The National Institutes of Health began testing an experimental COVID-19 vaccine. COVID-19 cases are rising in several regions of the United States. For the week ending June 29, the latest date for which data is available, COVID test positivity was 9% across the U.S. Test positivity was highest in the Southwest and western U.S., CDC data showed. Additionally,

wastewater data from the CDC shows that COVID viral activity is low nationally but has been steadily rising over the last month-and-a-half. For the week ending June 22, levels were classified as "high" in the West and "moderate" in the South.

Wastewater tracking is often used as an early detection tool for monitoring potential future upticks,

although it can be inconsistent. ABC News, CDC Dr. William Schaffner, a professor of preventive medicine at Vanderbilt University Medical Center, said the country has traditionally seen increases in COVID every summer, so a “bump” at this point in the year was to be expected, as experts had predicted. Schaffner said the

groups making up hospitalizations are those with chronic illnesses such as heart disease or lung disease, or those who are immunocompromised.

“KP.2” is now the dominant COVID variant. Experts say the U.S. may see a summer increase in cases. “Particularly older people ... with chronic illnesses, the immune-compromised, particularly if they are not up to date in their vaccination — that’s the population we see now contributing to that bump in hospitalizations,” he said.

Meanwhile, deaths have been steadily dropping since January of this year and continue to remain low, CDC data indicate. Schaffner said “Be sure this fall, when we have yet another updated vaccine, to get that vaccine along with your influenza vaccine. We update both of them now on an annual basis.” He recommended those in high-risk groups, or people who will be around high-risk groups, to consider masking in indoor crowded areas, and if they test positive to receive early treatment with antiviral medication such as Paxlovid.

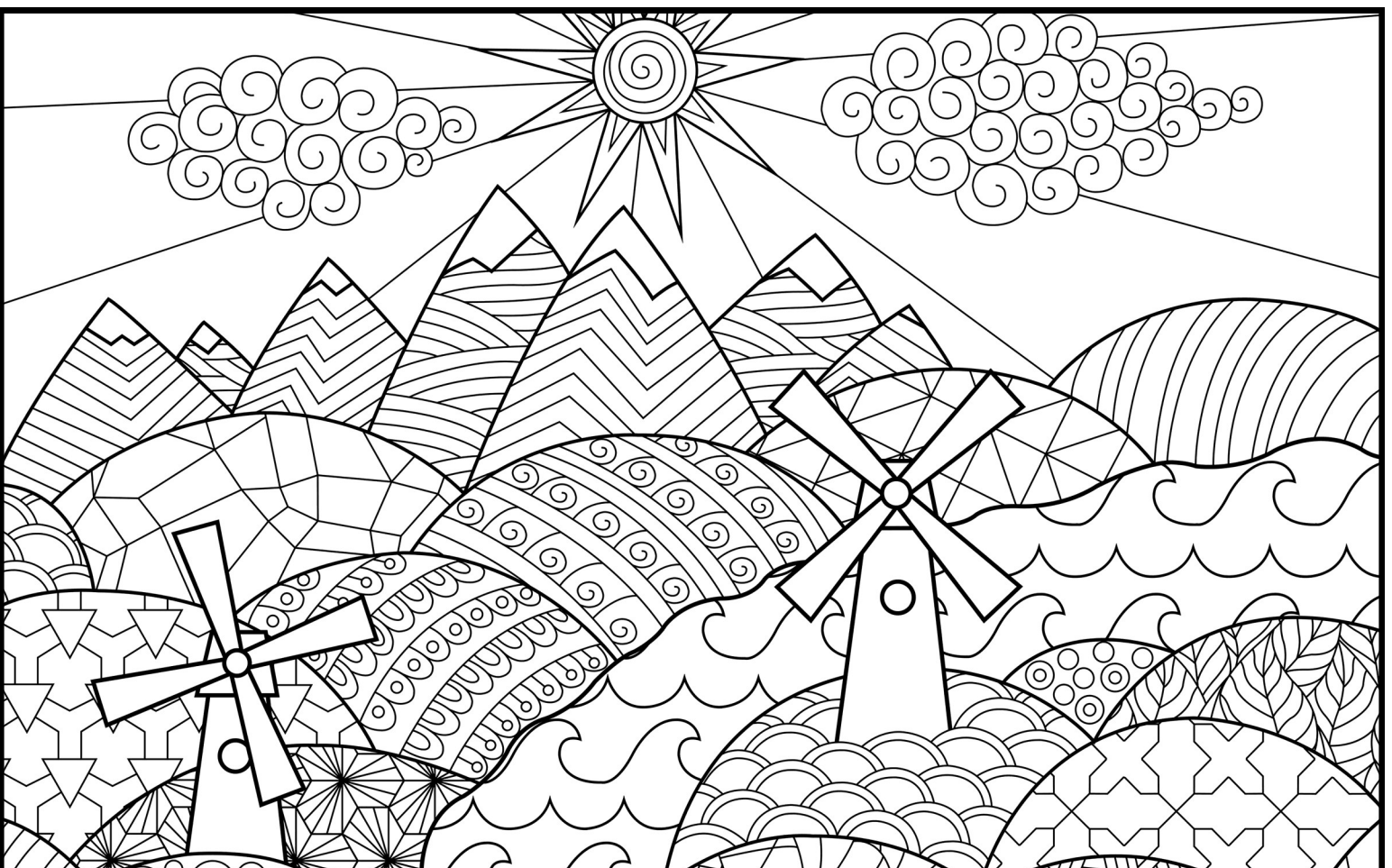
