Member Services Tip of the Week When the outside temperature gets below 32°, your apartment heater may not be able to maintain warm temperatures on its own. There are emergency heat strips that you will need to manually turn on by switching your thermostat to Emergency Heat. It should show on the thermostat as EMHEAT. This will allow the unit to produce more heat than with the regular "Heat" setting. We hope this helps and that everyone will stay warm and cozy. #### Scam Tip of the Week: **Third-Party Mail Providers**

Have you received a postcard or form in the mail about T-2 benefit information? A T-2 form is a postcard mailer that many senior citizens receive in the mail. The form looks official. With the postcard or envelope, the letter comes stamped in big, bold letters "Second Notice, Time Sensitive". You open the form and it appears to come from a government agency, stating at the top, "[year] Benefit Information for [state] Citizens Only." Underneath the heading, it states, "As a resident of [state], you are entitled to more benefits not provided by government funds. You now have access to a [year] state-regulated program which will pay 100% of all final expenses up to [dollar amount]." This particular T-2 form does not come from a

government agency and is not a tax form of any kind. It

This company, based in Georgia, is not the same as the companies mailing out the request forms. They only process the mail and send it out; they are not affiliated with the companies sending the mailers. Direct Mail Processing, LLC has an option on its website to opt out of future mailings and to submit a complaint about the mailers you receive. If you have received one of these mailers, you are encouraged to submit a complaint and opt out. Then, shred the mailer.

The fuller, or launderer, uses harsh and even putrid materials to prepare the wool from the shorn sheep. The fuller's shop was usually outside the city due to the very unclean smells and methods used. But the wool was purified to be a brilliant white and useable for many applications.

The silver refiner used a hot fire to melt and purify the silver so the dross would rise to the top to be skimmed off, resulting in a mirror-like surface on the silver. When the refiner could clearly see his reflection in the silver, then he knew it was pure.

If we desire to have peace with God, we also need to be purified, which might mean some painful processes to be taken in order to take out anything displeasing to God. But it's worth it. Jesus came to die - he took our sins and all our sorrows and made for us them his very own. We can receive peace today, as we allow God's refining processes in our lives on a daily basis. It is that time of year when you can see your breath while walking in the neighborhood, especially early in the morning or late at night. The weather the past few weeks has been all over the place. To really help you enjoy winter weather, you need to understand what wind chill is, and know when it can be dangerous. Basically, it's how cold the air feels when wind is factored in. This is the winter counterpart to the "heat index" when it comes to "feels-like" temperatures. The wind matters because of the way our bodies react to very cold temperatures.

When the air is cold, our bodies naturally warm a thin layer of air just above our skin. This helps to



keep us from rapidly losing body heat. Wind carries that layer of self-made insulation away from our bodies. Stronger wind carries that warmth away even faster, replacing that warm layer with cold air. Our bodies lose heat trying to warm the new cold air, the wind blows it away, and the cycle continues.

The final weeks of the calendar year will include the last full moon phase of 2024 reaching peak illumina-tion on Sunday, Dec. 15, at 3:02 a.m. CST. This month's full moon is traditionally called the "Cold Moon", according to the Old Farmer's Almanac. The cold season led Native Americans and early settlers to describe this moon as signaling the changing season and colder weather patterns. The report adds that and colder weather patterns. The report adds that "each full moon name was traditionally known as a time to prepare for winter's stronghold, and was traditionally applied to the entire lunar month in which it occurred, not solely to the full moon."

Check out information on meteor showers at https://www.amsmeteors.org/meteor-showers/meteorshower-calendar/ as there are several coming up. Geminids are currently active until Saturday Dec. 21. Next Peak night Dec 12–13. The Geminids will peak on Friday, Dec. 13. On this night, the moon will be 92% full. Ursids will be active from Dec. 16 to Dec. 26 and peak: Dec 21–22 (Moon 59% full.) Quadrantids will be active from Dec. 26 to Jan. 16 and peak Jan. 2-3 (Moon 11% full.)
