THE HIGH COST OF LIVING!

Everywhere you go, prices have skyrocketed — grocery stores, restaurants ... even the dollar store. At ACV, we are keenly aware that this has a profound impact on many seniors, especially those on fixed incomes. If that's the case, then why do ACV's fees keep increasing, and why do you keep getting letters from us asking you to give?

First, rest assured that decisions to increase fees are never made lightly. ACV leadership strives to avoid overburdening members while also covering the costs to operate this community.

If you research other retirement communities that offer the range of services available here, you'll find that ACV is unique in several ways. One significant difference is how we handle pricing. Most comprehensive retirement communities are called CCRCs (Continuing Care Retirement Communities). These communities charge their members large entrance fees up front to cover their costs. According to AARP, the average entrance fee is \$402,000 — and after move-in, additional monthly fees often equal as much as ACV's rents. ACV is different.

While ACV provides many of the same services, care, activities and amenities, we are not a CCRC. We want to serve people across the economic spectrum in Dowling Park, so we choose not to charge entrance fees. Every effort is made to keep other costs as reasonable as possible, while still providing a safe, quality environment.

In many CCRCs, residents who exhaust their financial resources no longer have access to services, activities and amenities, or they may be asked to leave the community altogether. At ACV, members who outlive their resources continue to have access to all services and amenities through help from the Benevolent Fund. Many people are helped each month, privately, behind the scenes. This is made possible through donor support. (More on this in a minute.)

ACV's leadership is sympathetic to the fact that in today's economy it is becoming increasingly difficult for members to stretch a dollar. The same is true for ACV. We also face the mounting cost of food, supplies and services. Minimum wage increases mandated by the 2020 vote have already cost ACV millions — with another mandated increase coming Sept. 30. Just as a family must deal with the rising cost of living by making adjustments, so also does ACV. Therefore, it has been necessary for ACV to pass along a portion of the rising costs to members. Those who are struggling to make ends meet are encouraged to discuss options with their service coordinator.

ACV's ministry is addressing needs in Christ's name, primarily through the Benevolent Fund. Therefore, we do invite people across the country — along with ACV members — to give, as they are able. The support offered is a tremendous blessing and makes many good things happen. However, if you are unable to give, there are still wonderful ways to support ACV that help reduce the need for fee increases.

When you use ACV's services (such as home care, rehab, the clinic, housekeeping, the Village Grocer, dining services, Village shops, etc.) instead of going to businesses outside the community, you generate revenue for ACV. This helps lower the need to increase fees.

In addition, when you volunteer, you reduce the need to hire additional staff, and you lighten the load for existing staff members. The need for volunteers is great, especially in summer. Consider stopping by MS to ask where you can help.

Finally, it cannot be overstated that those who pray for this ministry, its leaders, and staff members are a great blessing.

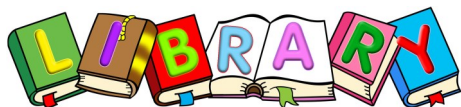

Scam Tip of the Week: Third-Party Mail Providers

Imposters pose as individuals on dating sites, social media sites, or even in person in an attempt to connect with potential victims. These imposters may convince would-be victims that they have similar interests, run in similar social circles, have compatible values and goals, or otherwise attempt to forge an emotional connection. Once the imposter has formed a connection with an individual, they claim they need money urgently to cover an emergency, deal with a family situation, take advantage of a business opportunity, recover from theft or a stolen identity, or to travel to meet them. Be wary of sending funds to a new friend or romantic interest. Prior to sending money, signing over property or providing gifts to a new friend, consult a financial advisor, attorney, or a trusted friend or family member.

If you believe you are the victim of a scam, file a complaint with the Attorney General's Office online at www.myfloridalegal.com or by phone at 1-866-9-NO-SCAM. You may also file a complaint with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, which acts as the State's consumer complaint clearinghouse, at www.floridaconsumerhelp.com. 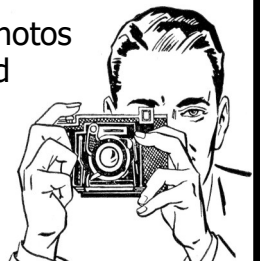

FRAUD PREVENTION TIPS

If you can answer “Yes” to any of the following questions, you could be involved in a fraud or are about to be scammed!

- x Are you sending money, gift cards, checks or any money orders to anyone you met online or over the phone?
 - x Have you been informed that you are the winner of a lottery, Publisher's Clearing House, or any other prizes?
 - x Have you been instructed to wire, send or ship money as soon as possible to pay for a debt or arrest warrant, to bail a family member out of jail, or to take care of an IRS tax debt?
 - x Did you respond to an unknown email, text message, or phone call asking to verify any of your personal banking or credit account information or provide your personal information such as name, date of birth, etc.?
- ➔ The IRS, FBI, or any form of U.S. government will not call you, message you, or request that you pay them over the phone or through gift cards, or by mailing cash.
- ➔ If you receive a call stating a loved one or friend is injured, arrested, or in an accident, do not provide any information. Obtain detailed information and call the appropriate authorities to determine if the contact is real or fraudulent.
- ➔ Never provide your personal or any banking information to anyone online or over the phone, or to anyone you do not personally know and can trust with said information.
