Member Services Tip of the Week

Remember to take precautions during the heat of the summer to stay well-hydrated and avoid prolonged sun exposure. It is important to drink lots of fluids. Soda, tea, and coffee should not be counted as helpful fluids because they can lead to dehydration.

Scam Tip of the Week: **Publishers Clearing House Imposter Scam** 

Unfortunately, there are a TON of scammers out there fraudulently posing as Publishers Clearing House (PCH), just eager to tell innocent folks like you and me that they have won a prize. But beware because these scammers are not from the REAL Publishers Clearing House. They are just trying to rob you of your hardearned money.

- The Prize Patrol NEVER notifies major prize winners by phone.
- The Prize Patrol NEVER notifies major prize winners by Facebook. And they don't send friend requests either!
- PCH will NEVER ask you to pay a fee to claim ANY prize (and that includes buying a Green Dot Money Pak Card)!
- PCH does NOT use the phrase "US dollars".
- No one from PCH will contact you via a Gmail or Yahoo account.

Even though these are some of the BIGGEST telltale signs that someone is trying to scam you, there are always new techniques out there that scammers will use to get your money. So any time you have even the slightest feeling that you are being scammed, look for these red flag warning signs! (Source: Victoria C., PCH Creative)

### **EGRETS AND HERONS**

Recently, I have observed several egrets flitting from one lawn to another as I am walking. Snowy egrets nest in colonies on thick vegetation in isolated places, such as barrier islands, dredge-spoil islands, salt marsh islands, swamps, and marshes. They often change location from year to year. During the breeding season snowy egrets feed in estuaries, saltmarshes, tidal channels, shallow bays, and mangroves. They winter in mangroves, saltwater lagoons, freshwater swamps, grassy ponds, and temporary pools, and forage on beaches, shallow reefs, and wet fields.

Males establish nesting territories and choose nest sites within the thick vegetation of a breeding colony. The nest is usually in the top or outer branches of a woody vine, shrub, or tree. The male starts working on a nest before finding a mate. Then the female takes over and ends up doing most of the nest building,

with materials supplied by the male.

Juvenile Little Blue Herons are white, similar to the egrets. The largest heron in North America, Great White, is very rare outside of central and southern Florida (and quite rare elsewhere in its range; confined to the Caribbean). Though they are regular throughout most of the southern half of the state, Florida Bay holds the majority of known Great White Herons, with about 850 breeding pairs. Very few are known to breed anywhere else in the world.

Given their apparently small population, Great Whites exhibit a rather strong tendency to stray, with vagrant records west to Texas, north to maritime Canada, and inland to the Great Lakes. Along with their large size, a most prominent feature is the very heavy and mostly yellow bill. Compared to the superficially similar Great Egret, the Great White is heavier overall and not as bright white, and the legs are dusky pale to

grayish yellow.

The Great White prefers saltwater, inhabiting mangroves, tidal shallows, or coastal ponds. It is mostly solitary, usually moving slowly and deliberately. Snowy egret populations were stable from 1966 to 2019, according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey. Partners in Flight estimates the global breeding population at 2.1 million and rates them 7 out of 20 on the Continental Concern Score, indicating a species of low conservation concern.


**FITNESS BASICS:** Copeland Center staff is available to assist members with the machines in the exercise room. If you are interested, please call the CCC at 658–5555.


