Member Services Tip of the Week

In an effort to reduce the cost of printing the weekly *Friendly Neighbor News*, ACV uses abbreviations and acronyms throughout. You can find a list of those used to describe locations around the Village at the bottom of the second page of this FNN.

Scam Tip of the Week: Fake Bill Scam

Here's a scenario you might encounter: You go to the dentist's office, which is one location of a chain of dentist offices. While there, you pay the copay, which is all you should need to pay because you have insurance to cover the rest. Two weeks later, you receive a bill from the corporate office claiming that you owe more money — perhaps a lot of money. You panic. You quickly call the number on the bill, and they tell you that payment must be made in full or they are going to turn you over to a collection agency, and your credit score will take a nose dive.

If you receive a bill that you are not expecting, be suspicious. Scammers can create bills that LOOK like they are from a reputable company and claim that you owe them money. If you call the phone number on the bill, you are calling the scammer, not the company they claim to be.

The first thing you should do when receiving an unexpected bill is find a number you KNOW is safe for whatever company the bill appears to come from. That could be from a past bill, the internet, or even directory assistance. If you need help doing that, contact your service coordinator. Following the example above, you could contact the local dentist's office. They can tell you if you actually owe the company any money.

The pressure scammers can put on you is very scary. Sometimes we act before we really think about what is going on because we don't want to get into trouble. If you do give in and pay and then realize after you've hung up the phone that you've been scammed, immediately try to stop the payment at whatever financial institution is being used. It is also a good idea

to file a police report. There have been times when scammers have been caught by police using information turned in to them.

The main points are these: Be suspicious of any communication you receive that you are not expecting, whether that's an email, text message, phone call, or something mailed to you. Don't allow yourself to be pressured into agreeing to anything or doing anything because the other party is indicating that action must be taken immediately. Take the time to think about what is being asked of you and whether it makes sense. And always do your research!

People choking, having heart attacks, and falling and injuring themselves. I heard this morning of a neighbor who had fallen outside and was not found for a bit of time. It reminded me that it would not hurt to

have a Life Alert-type of device, particularly if you live alone. How many times have you climbed on a ladder or stepstool and reached so far you almost fell? Check with your coordinator to see what might be available.

I came across this story online and wondered what would our fire department do? Three goats and a dog walked into a fire station. (It sounds like the beginning of a tall tale, but it happened last week in New Bedford, Massachusetts, when a veritable menagerie caught the attention of a crew of first responders.) According to the New Bedford Fire Department, members of Engine 5 noticed a mother goat with two babies and a dog walking down the street without a human escort. Concerned about the animals' safety, the firefighters herded them into their fire station until they could be returned to their home, which turned out to be just a short distance from the station.

Weather.com has provided some interesting information for November. A warmer-than-usual November means fall allergies are sticking around, with ragweed and mold levels still high due to delays in colder weather. The sawing of tree limbs spreads dust in the air, which may also cause a reaction similar to allergies. The arrival of fall brings cooler temperatures that not only feel great, one air quality expert says fall is also the perfect time to do open windows and doors. Midday is the best time to do this.
