> Scam Tip of the Week: **Social Security Scams**

The No. 1 thing Social Security scammers do is solicit information from people over the phone by posing as representatives for the Social Security Administration (SSA). They trick people into giving them personal information including their Social Security numbers and bank transfer information. These con artists prey on unsuspecting victims by claiming the authority of the agency and then telling them there's a problem with their account. their account.

The following are facts to keep in mind about the SSA:

- Social Security accounts are never suspended.
- The SSA will never ask for your Social Security number over the phone.
- Anytime someone calls claiming a citizen owes the
- SSA money, this is a lie and a scam.

 The SSA will not call you regarding issues with your account. Their first and most common method is always by letters in the mail.
- The SSA will not pressure recipients to respond with deadlines and payments.

People should never give out personal information over the phone, and if they believe a call might be legitimate they should hang up, check their account online, and then initiate a call to the SSA if need be. (Source: Daily360.com)

Helicopter Operations As you may know, the field next to the Harmony Center on Buck Rogers Drive is the medical helicopter landing site for western Suwannee County. To enhance safety during helicopter operations at ACV, a new safety measure will be implemented on Buck Rogers Drive. This comes in response to concerns about vehicles and golf carts approaching during helicopter landings and takeoffs, with loose items posing a risk of being sucked up into the rotor blades. These incidents not only endanger the flight crew but also increase stress on the Suwannee County Fire Rescue team and patients in need of critical care.

As part of the new safety measures, two white boundary lines will be painted across the road, accom-

VOTE BY MAIL INFORMATION

According to the Suwannee County Supervisor of Elections website, "A voter, or someone designated by the voter, may request a vote-by-mail ballot from the supervisor of elections in person, by mail, or by telephone. One request can cover all elections within a calendar year. If you would like to have a vote-by-mail ballot mailed to you, contact your supervisor of elections by 5:00 p.m. on the sixth day before an election" (Oct. 30 this year). "The person requesting a voteby-mail ballot must disclose the name of the voter for whom the ballot is requested; the voter's address; the voter's date of birth; the requester's name; the requester's address; the requester's driver's license number, if available; the requester's relationship to the voter; and the requester's signature (written request

"Marked ballots must be mailed or delivered in person reaching the supervisor of elections office no later than 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election. Do not

return your voted absentee ballot to a polling place.
"A designee may pick up a vote-by-mail ballot for a voter on election day or up to four days before election day. A designee may only pick up two vote-by-mail ballots per election, other than his or her own ballot or ballots for members of his or her immediate family. Designees must have written authorization from the voter, present a picture I.D., and sign an affidavit.

you have obtained a vote-by-mail ballot but are able to vote in your precinct on election day, you must take the absentee ballot with you to the polls, whether or not it has been marked. However, if you are unable to return the ballot, you may vote a provisional ballot.

If you are used to voting by mail, please be aware that you must now request to receive vote-bymail ballots each calendar year there are elections. If you have not yet requested a ballot to be mailed to you in 2024, call the Suwannee County Supervisor of Elections office at (386) 362-2616 as soon as possible.
