### **FLU VACCINES ARE HERE**

Flu vaccines are available at the Copeland Clinic! Please call the clinic to schedule your flu vaccine on Wednes-day or Friday afternoons. Vaccines can also be administered at any regularly scheduled appointment. According to the CDC, people 65 years and older

are at higher risk of developing serious flu complica-tions. This increased risk is due in part to changes in immune defenses with increasing age. In recent years, it is estimated that between 70% and 85% of seasonal flu-related deaths have occurred in people 65 years and older, and between 50% and 70% of seasonal flurelated hospitalizations have occurred among people in this age group.

The best way to protect against flu and its potentially serious complications is with a flu vaccine. Annual vaccination helps to ensure the best possible protection against flu.

### Scam Tip of the Week: Norton Genie

NortonLifeLock has released a new FREE phone and tablet app for both Apple and Android devices called Norton Genie: AI Scam Detector. This app encourages you to paste in text or screenshots of suspicious messages you receive through text or email, or something you see on social media. The app will analyze what you provide and let you know if it thinks it is a scam or if it is legitimate. It will even check out any links that are included. If it is a scam, Genie will ask follow-up questions and give advice on how to react to the scam.

Genie does not automatically detect scams on your device; you must provide messages by pasting text or uploading a screenshot to the app in order for it to analyze it.


