COVID, RSV & FLU VACCINE CLINIC

ACV's Copeland Clinic and Walgreens will host a vaccine clinic on Tuesday, Oct. 1, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon in SMR/DR. Walgreens will have both the recently released 2024-2025 mRNA COVID-19 vaccine and the RSV vaccine. Copeland Clinic will have flu vaccines available as well.

The CDC recommends that everyone ages six months and older should get the new COVID vaccine. It is especially important if you are ages 65 and older, are at high risk for severe COVID, or have never received a COVID vaccine. Vaccine protection decreases over time, so it is important to stay up to date with your COVID vaccine.

The CDC recommends a single dose of the RSV vaccine for all adults ages 75 and older to help prevent serious RSV infection and hospitalization. If you have already received the RSV vaccine, you do not need to get another.

Vaccines are available for both residents and staff members. Please call MS at 658-5400 to sign up and complete a consent form no later than Sept. 26 for the COVID and RSV vaccines. You do not need to sign up or complete any paperwork if you only want to receive the flu vaccine.

Flu vaccines are also available at Copeland Clinic. Please call the clinic to schedule your flu vaccine on Wednesday or Friday afternoons. Vaccines can also be administered at any regularly scheduled appointment.

You can protect yourself and your community by staying up to date with recommended vaccinations!

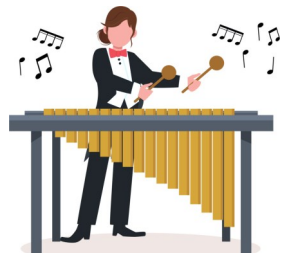

jury duty. The scammers claim the victim must pay a
fine immediately or they will be arrested. Know that a
court official will never ask for you to wire money or ask
for your confidential information over the phone or via
email.

If you believe you are the victim of a scam, file a
complaint with the Attorney General's Office online at
www.myfloridalegal.com or by phone at 1-866-9-NO-
SCAM. You may also file a complaint with the Florida
Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services,
which acts as the State's consumer complaint clearing-
house, at www.floridaconsumerhelp.com. (Source: The
Florida Attorney General's Office)
