COVID, RSV & FLU VACCINE CLINIC

ACV's Copeland Clinic and Walgreens will host a vaccine clinic on Tuesday, Oct. 1, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon in SMR/DR. Walgreens will have both the recently released 2024-2025 mRNA COVID-19 vaccine and the vaccine. Copeland Clinic will have flu vaccines RSV available as well.

The CDC recommends that everyone ages six months and older should get the new COVID vaccine. It at high risk for severe COVID, or have never received a COVID vaccine. Vaccine protection decreases over time, so it is important to stay up to date with your COVID vaccine.

The CDC recommends a single dose of the RSV vaccine for all adults ages 75 and older to help prevent serious RSV infection and hospitalization. If you have already received the RSV vaccine, you do not need to get another.

Vaccines are available for both residents and staff members. Please call MS at 658-5400 to sign up and complete a consent form no later than Sept. 26 for the COVID and RSV vaccines. You do not need to sign up or complete any paperwork if you only want to receive the flu vaccine.

Flu vaccines are also available at Copeland Clinic. Please call the clinic to schedule your flu vaccine on Wednesday or Friday afternoons. Vaccines can also be administered at any regularly scheduled appointment.

Scam Tip of the Week: Arrest Warrant Scam

Similar to the jury duty scam, imposters pose as law enforcement officers and call or email a potential victim claiming that they have a warrant out for their arrest or are otherwise being pursued by law enforcement. The imposters will claim the victim must pay them immedi-ately or they will be arrested. Know that a law enforcement or court official will never ask for you to wire money or ask for your confidential information over the phone or via email.

If you believe you are the victim of a scam, file a complaint with the Attorney General's Office online at www.myfloridalegal.com or by phone at 1-866-9-NO-SCAM. You may also file a complaint with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, which acts as the State's consumer complaint clearinghouse, at www.floridaconsumerhelp.com. (Source: The Florida Attorney General's Office)

ACV QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Do you have a question about the Village you think others would also like to ask? Submit your question to MS, and we will do our best to find out the answer for you and publish it here.

Q: What are the rules for pets in common areas?

A: Unless an animal is a medical service animal, meaning they have been trained to provide a medical service, they are only allowed to be on the floor if they are being walked from the apartment in which they live to an exterior exit, and they must be on a leash. Owners should not linger in common areas such as lobbies while their pet is on the floor. Pets can be carried or pushed in some kind of carrier for longer periods in common areas. Only medical service animals are allowed to do more than pass through areas where food is served.

PROTECT YOUR HOME

Submitted by Betsey Ruehl While you think you are taking every precaution to protect your home and make it as burglar-proof as possible, there are things about your home that trans-form it into a beacon for thieves. Here they are:

A dark home is fixed by porch lights, motiondetector lights, and timers on interior lamps.

- No cars parked on the driveway may mean there are no people inside the house. "In addition to security cues like alarm systems, burglars look for what is referred to as 'occupancy cues', or givea-ways that tell them whether you are home," warns security and intelligence professional K. Campbell, principal at Blue Glacier Security & Intelligence LLC. To avoid such situations, ask a family member, neighbor or friend to park their vehicles in your driveway when you are away, especially, if you will be missing for a longer period of time.
- Make a habit of closing and locking all windows especially on the ground floor. Close the drapes.
- Trim the bushes and maintain your lawn.
- Tell about your travels when you return home. Refrain from oversharing your travel plans and whereabouts on social media.
- If you intend to be away from home for longer, ask a neighbor or friend to take care of your newspapers and packages.
- An unlocked garage is a sure way for a burglar to reach the rest of your home. While away, disable the automatic garage door openers to avoid being opened by intruders.
- To prevent intruders from finding useful tools that enable their break-in, secure your tools after you have finished your work with them and lock your storage sheds and similar buildings.
- Security experts recommend ditching the practice of hiding a spare key. Give an extra key to a trusted neighbor, for emergency situations or install a keypad lock.
- Keep your valuable items hidden from prying eyes.
- Home security specialists recommend having small security signs or security decals strategically placed around your home to scare off possible intruders. Fake security cameras or signs with "beware of dog" might also do the trick. The best protection comes from a home security system.

EXCERPTS FROM THE ACV EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS GUIDE

After the Storm

- Keep listening to a radio, TV, NOAA Weather Radio, and TV2 for storm or damage information and Village news.
- If you have evacuated, call your service coordinator before returning to the Village to make sure everything is okay with your home or apartment.
- Upon arriving at the Village, contact your service coordinator to let them know of your return.
- Wait until an area is declared safe before entering.
- Avoid weakened bridges and washed out roads. Do not drive into flooded areas.
- Stay on firm ground.
- Check gas, water, electrical lines, and appliances for damage.
- If you are off campus, avoid drinking or preparing foods with tap water until you are certain it is not contaminated.
- Avoid using candles and other open flames indoors. Use flashlights.
- Check on your neighbors to see if assistance is needed.
- Telephone services will be busy right after the storm so avoid over use of the telephone. If the power is out, Village phone lines may not be working proper-ly. In that case, you may try to reach Village person-nel at alternate number (386) 658-3332.
- If you have any damage to your facility, report this to the IC. Please only report severe damage to structures immediately following a storm. In the event of a major disaster, a special emergency telephone number will be established for calling and reporting damage to structures. This number will be made available at the time of the emergency.

What to Do in Case of a Power Failure

Residents who are using oxygen should first check their oxygen supply to see if they can wait an hour

or two to see if power is resumed before going to another location. If they do not have enough oxygen on hand to wait an hour or two, they should proceed to either the lobby of DH, CH, or RV. These facilities are equipped with emergency generators. Red electrical cover plates in the lobbies of these facilities indicate emergency back up now on the If a indicate emergency back-up power supply. If a resident needs help with moving oxygen equipment, they should call the IC and ask for assistance.

- If possible, turn off or disconnect motor-driven appliances and equipment, such as air conditioning units and computers, to avoid damage from sudden surges when power is restored.
- Avoid using candles or kerosene lanterns as they might result in a fire. Use a flashlight.
- Village phone lines may not be working properly during a power failure. In that case, you may try to reach Village personnel at alternate number (386) 658-3332 in an emergency.

What to Do in Case of a Prolonged Power Failure (More Than 12 Hours)

- Residents should stay in their homes as long as possible unless they are on oxygen, have other medical difficulties, or feel uncomfortable.
- Open the freezer and refrigerator as seldom as possible. Food will stay frozen for up to 48 hours if a freezer is full, tightly packed, and the door is kept closed. Food in a partly filled freezer may keep for up to 24 hours.

Transportation Needs

During a Power Failure Contact the IC for transportation needs. When the shuttle bus is running, the IC can contact the driver for transportation. Otherwise, the security coordinator or the Administrator on Call will be called for assistance.




